Ocean Isle Beach Goats

Ocean Isle Beach was in the news this last April due to a controversy involving the Ocean Isle Beach goats. What Ocean Isle Beach goats? You ask. If you haven't seen our "famous" Ocean Isle Beach goats, you better hurry, since they might not be around very long. Even though everyone refers to them as the Ocean Isle Beach goats, they don't actually live on the island. They live on the spoil islands just off the islands of Ocean Isle Beach and Sunset Beach. There are fresh water lagoons on the islands, and plenty of trees for the goats to use as shade. These spoil islands resulted when the US Corps of Engineers created the Intracoastal Waterway, and the goats have probably been on this land ever since. No one seems to know where they came from, but they might be descendants of some original Spanish goats. Spanish goats, which no longer exist in Spain, were brought to the New World in the sixteenth century. For over three

hundred years, Spanish goats were the only goats around in the Southern part of the United States. They're very hardy and able to survive in adverse climatic conditions. They're strong, fertile, and can handle extreme heat. They're also very large. Some people who see our island goats from afar assume they're deer or cows because of their large size. The descendants of Spanish goats are also known as "Brush Goats", since they're used for brush control.

Back to the controversy. The spoil islands are the property of the state, and the state wanted to remove the goats, and auction them out to the highest bidder on the condition that they be removed between May 18 and June 4. Plans have changed due to the amount of negative feedback the plan received from both permanent residents and visitors who have enjoyed seeing the OIB goats all these years. What to do in case of jellyfish stings?

We don't want to think about it, but it happens. While we don't have the very dangerous man-o-war, we do see an occasional jellyfish on our beaches, and their sting is not pleasant. As far as most people know, all jellyfish have tentacles and are capable of stinging. However, there are over 2,000 known species of jellyfish and a number of them do not even have tentacles. Even among those species that do have tentacles, not all species are harmful to humans. On the other hand, some jellyfish have venom that is considered amongst the most deadly in the world. Jellyfish tentacles are equipped with nematocysts which are stinging, harpoon-like cells, used to inject toxins as a defense mechanism. They're very small, but their great number makes them very efficient. When stung, the nematocysts are imbedded in the skin even after the tentacle is removed, so you definitely don't

want to rub the area. Avoid pouring fresh water on the nematocysts, since this will further activate them. If vinegar is not readily available, pour some ocean water on the affected area. You might want to use a pair of tweezers to dislodge the nematocysts, but be careful to not touch them with your bare hands. If you don't have tweezers handy (does anybody carry tweezers to the beach?), use a seashell to scrape off the nematocysts. White distilled vinegar, or even apple cider vinegar will quickly neutralize the sting, so it's a good idea to include a small, plastic bottle of vinegar in your tote bag. I've also heard an old wife's tale claiming that urine works wonders for jellyfish stings, but, while this is still debatable, the biggest question is, who wants to try this when other methods work? Most jellyfish stings are not deadly, just uncomfortable, and very itchy. An over the counter hydrocortisone cream will do wonders for the itch.

Skywheel

It is, after all, twenty stories high. If you look south from the top you can see the old Pavilion ferris wheel, which is now at Family Kingdom. It looks like a toy. The Skywheel ride was delightful. The gondolas are very comfortable, and the ride is slow enough that you get to really enjoy the view, take lots of pictures, and be thankful that you're not on the bungie jump ride across the street. They're still trying to get their alcohol license, and eventually you'll be able to buy a drink at Jimmy Buffet's Landshark Bar and Grill at the foot of the Skywheel, and bring it up with you.
