Brown Pelicans

When you visit Ocean Isle Beach, you can't help but notice the many seagulls squawking overhead, insisting on getting fed any kind of scrap of food you drop; but take a closer look around, and you can spot our beautiful pelicans quietly gliding over the shoreline.

The Eastern Brown Pelican, found along the Atlantic Coast, from Virginia to the mouth of the Amazon River, in South America, is a long time resident of Ocean Isle Beach. Adult Brown Pelicans are usually

silent birds, except for their low, hoarse sounding mating call. Unlike the smaller, noisy seagull, the pelican exists among us, mostly unnoticed. But when you catch a glimpse of a single file or V formation of pelicans soaring along the waves, run and get your camera, and try to capture the pelicans' quiet beauty.

As the smallest of the eight species of pelicans, our Brown Pelican is still an impressive bird, with a length of around four feet, and a wingspan between six and eight feet. The Brown Pelican is the only species of pelican that dives for fish from the air, sometimes from heights of 60 feet above the surface, as opposed to fishing from the water surface, as do other pelicans. One unfounded myth is that their dive bombing makes pelicans go blind. The truth is that Mother Nature knew what it was doing by providing them with air sacs just below the surface of the skin, which cushions the impact when the pelican hits the water.

Baby pelicans are usually hatched in groups of three, and they're cared for by their parents for eight to ten months. Brown pelicans feed mainly on herring-like fish. After a dive, they point their large beaks up to the sky, to let the water drain out. They then throw the fish up, to turn it (like flipping pancakes), so they can swallow it head first. Why do they do this? So the

fins don't get caught in their throats. While their beaks are open, an occasional seagull will try to steal the fish right out of the pelican's pouch, called a gular. Seagulls will even perch on the pelican's head when it comes out of the dive, waiting for their chance when the beak opens.

The Spanish name for pelican is *Alcatraz* for which the Island of Alcatraz, just outside San Francisco, CA was named, in 1775 by the Spanish explorer Juan Manuel de Ayala, due to the large number of pelicans that nested there. The Brown Pelican is protected by the Migratory Bird Treaty Act of 1918. According to the



Audubon Society, NC is home to approximately 4,000 nesting pairs of Brown Pelicans. We're fortunate that due to the effects of the Gulf Stream, our coastal waters stay warm enough for us to enjoy these beautiful creatures all year round.

Canal Dredging

Commonly referred to as Concrete Canals, thirteen boat channels

were created in the 1960's, and they provide waterway access to about 800 properties. In order to make the canals accessible to boats even during low tide, the canals are dredged every few years. This winter, Marcol Dredging Co., of Charleston, SC, will remove over 56,000 CY of dredge material. This sand and sediment will be deposited about half a mile west of the bridge, along the Intracoastal Waterway, in compliance with the NC Environmental Policy Act.
